Ward had been a driver for the Starke Co Senior Citizens bus. Also, he was a memb the Knox Masonic Lodge.

Knox Man And Traveling Evangelist Killed

NOX-The travels of the Peace rim, whose journies have taken across the United States seven es, ended here Tuesday when she local resident Ewell Ward, 70, e killed in a two-car collision.

fildred Norman Ryder, 71, who is ter known nationally as the Peace grim s instantly killed when the a passenger in which was ren by Ward was hit head on by ther vehicle on S. R. 23, a half mile th of 75N. She sustained a broken k and a crushed chest. Ward died a frontal skull fracture, crushed st and fractured jaw bones.

The driver of the other car, Dana McPheron, RR 2, Knox, was taken to Starke Memorial Hospital where she was treated for multiple abrasions and contusions. She is in satisfactorycondition.

McPheron told police she was southbound on S.R. 23 when she realized she was on the wrong side of the highway after exiting a narrow bridge. She told Starke County police officer Chat Fletcher that she tried to move back to the southbound lane when she oversteered the vehicle she was driving and found herself headed for a mail box.

The Knox woman lost control of the vehicle at that point and crossed back into the north bound lane where she collided into a car driven by Ward:

The Peace Pilgrim, who has traveled through out the United States andthe ten provinces of Canada, was visiting the Ward family at the time of the accident.

Ryder, who began her journies in 1953, walked across the the United States seven times, preaching her word of peace at colleges, churches, high schools and civic clubs. The pilgrim, who wore a blue tunic which had large white letters that read

"Peace Pilgrim" and "25,000 M On Foot For Peace" had orginally ly planned to walk 25,000 but once accomplished that in 1953 she i tinued with her travels.

The evangelist went through out country and Canada preaching the way to peace was to "overco evil with good, and falsehood v truth, and hatred with love. Golden Rule would do as well."

Masonic services for Ward, a K Masonic Lodge member and Sta County Senior Citizens bus driver, be held Friday at 2 p.m. Services still pending for Mrs. Ryder.
